Can We Talk?

STUDENT ACTIVITY

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

This language arts communication activity accompanies the Student Text "Capturing a Whisper." The warm-up activity focuses on the importance of clear communication and how a message can be altered if it passes through a good deal of space. Communication isn't always verbal. Exercises in this activity deal with external effects of non-verbal communication.

PROCEDURE

Warm-up activity

- 1. Read the Student Text, "Capturing a Whisper."
- 2. Create a distance communication string. Your teacher will provide you with a message. Whisper that message to the next student in the row.
- 3. The last person conveys the message aloud to the class.
- 4. The first person reads the original message.
- 5. Compare messages, noting changes. How do messages change in time and space?

Non-verbal communication effects

Now that you have engaged in a verbal communication activity, let's look at non-verbal communication and how it can impact a verbal communication effort. A good way to find out how this works is to engage in distance activities.

Horizontal:

- 1. Pair up with another student and begin a conversation while standing two feet apart. At one minute intervals, take a small step forward (approximately six inches each time) until you are standing and conversing six inches apart.
- 2. After a minute of conversation at a six-inch distance, curtail the conversation. How did distance affect your comfort?
- 3. What effect did horizontal distance have on your conversation? Did distance influence the outcome of your conversation?

Vertical: (Adult Supervision Recommended)

- 1. Again pair up with another student. Role-play a disagreement between the two of you, with one being a teacher and the other a student, or a police officer and a driver, a waitperson and a restaurant diner, or a similar situation. Begin the argument while seated across from one another.
- 2. After a minute has passed, the person playing the teacher, police officer, etc., should stand and continue the conversation while the other member remains seated.
- After another minute, the person who is standing should stand on a stool while the other person remains seated.



- 4. Discuss the activity, the effects of height on communication, and how non-verbal strategies can affect the outcome of a conversation.
- 5. Can you provide illustrations where this is clearly a strategy to achieve an effect?

External Effects:

There are a multitude of external effects that can impact communication. Environment is a big factor. Choose one of the following environmental impactors and write a paragraph on how this factor can affect communication.

- Room color
